1st INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON INMATES TRANSFORMATIVE EDUCATION FOR SUCCESSFUL RE-ENTRY

Social Hall, University of Southeastern Philippines
Davao City, Philippines
May 16-17, 2018

BACKGROUND

This conference explores the role of the different stakeholders in prison-based education in reducing recidivism, addressing social stigma, and in providing an empowerment platform for inmates to become renewed and functional individuals. Most of the scholarly works in the area of prison-based education highlight the direct link of education to reducing recidivism (Bhatti, 2010; Brosensa, De Dondera, Durya, Vanwinga, & Vertéa, 2015; Kim & Clark, 2013; Lockwood, Nally, Ho, & Knutson, 2012). However, many studies have pointed out more than this to include the effects of prison-based education to enhancement of general well-being and life chances of inmates and their families (Bhatti, 2010; Brosensa et al., 2015). Prisoners in Belgium, for example, have the right during their detention to access social-cultural activities (e.g. library, sport activities, cultural activities, and mental health care).

Historically, prison-based education all over the world is carried out by both private and public organizations. Private organizations usually conduct their education program for prisoners for humanitarian grounds while public organizations do it to either comply with the law and/or innovate (Kim & Clark, 2013). However, effects of prison-based education on recidivism, in particular, are complex. It is difficult to identify the effects of various types of educational programs, namely, technical, basic (primary and secondary), and tertiary education on reducing re-arrest, re-conviction, and re-incarceration of offenders at any time from release.

The right to education is essential, especially for inmates who have limited life chances and opportunities to access the service under mainstream or normal conditions. The emerging roles played by courts, church, police, civil society and jail management and other stakeholders are truly important to help ensure that inmates and their families get the right and dignified support to start their lives back again after release from prison. Throughout the long history of corrections, religious education has greatly influenced the treatment plan for inmates.

College Education Behind Bars addresses the educational and transformative aspects of its rehabilitative program. For centuries, churches have been among the first institutions to provide refuge for inmates. Some historical studies attribute the actual establishment of prisons and penitentiaries to the religious idea that allowed offenders to obtain penance for their crimes, to be isolated for a time, and then to be reconciled by asking forgiveness for their crimes. Most jails established a regular chaplaincy as part of their program. We view the combination of college education and a step rehabilitation program as an integral part to inmates' transformation. The Social Entrepreneurship, Technology and Business Institute designed and implemented its "College Education Behind Bars" program inside the Davao City Jail in partnership with the University of Southeastern Philippines (USeP) and the Philippine Bureau

of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP). The program is the only of its kind in the Philippines.

CONFERENCE THEMES

You are invited to submit your abstract for the 1st International Conference on Inmates' Transformative Education for Successful Re-entry on May 14-15, 2018 at the Social Hall, University of Southeastern Philippines, Davao City, Philippines.

With the theme "Hope for Restoration—Today's Inmate is Tomorrow's Neighbor," this conference will promote collaboration among the five pillars of the Criminal Justice System, namely, the NGOs, Community Leaders, Academic Leaders, Criminal Justice Practitioners, and students to share experiences, recommendations, and findings of their quantitative and qualitative studies in prison-based education and other related topics such as drug addiction, recidivism, and rehabilitation.

The conference will feature interdisciplinary panels focusing on the impact of prison-based education on inmates' behavior upon re-entry into society and on recidivism. The two-day conference aims to promote a lively discussion on the importance of education in the future development of the Criminal Justice System as well as the prevailing approaches to its progress.

We invite all researchers to submit abstracts of their papers to be eligible to present at the conference. We seek papers that explore the questions that include, but are not limited to, these topics:

- Transformative prison-based education for successful re-entry
- The role and effects of technical, basic (primary and secondary) and tertiary education on inmates' behavior, rehabilitation, and recidivism rates
- Development of prison-based curriculum
- Assessment of outcomes of prison-based education
- The types of education for inmates that the general public will accept and support
- The future development of the Criminal Justice System
- The role of the five pillars of the Criminal Justice System, such as law enforcement, courts, prosecution, corrections, and civil society
- Best solutions to counteract overcrowded and underfunded jails
- The role of religious education inside prison
- Approaches in managing social stigma for successful re-entry
- Drug addiction, recidivism and rehabilitation.
- Other related current situations and issues

Paper presenters should fill up and submit the attached Abstract Submission Form and Registration Form. Participants and others who will not present papers only need to submit the accomplished Registration Form to **immatesconference@gmail.com** on or before April 30, 2018.

PAPER SUBMISSION

Those interested in presenting papers may email their abstracts to <u>inmatesconference@gmail.com</u>. All proposals will be peer reviewed. Undergraduate papers will not be considered for the conference.

For paper presentations, kindly submit your abstracts (maximum of 250 words) containing the research problem to be addressed, its added value to the existing literature, methodology, results and conclusion/recommendation using the attached Abstract Submission Form.

Deadline for abstract proposals: April 10, 2018. The notification for acceptance of paper proposals will be made on or before April 15, 2018.

Submission of full paper is encouraged but not a requirement to qualify for paper presentation.

Those who plan to submit their full paper must be guided by the following:

The full paper should be well-organized, concise, and should contain information on the following:

The Title

Title Page (title, author/s, designation, department and organization, and email address). Title of the paper should be in capital letters. In case the title exceeds one line, it should be in inverted pyramid form. Underline the full name(s) of the author(s) starting from the first/given name. An asterisk must be placed after the name of the author who will present the paper. In case the paper has many authors presenting one or different institutions, superscript numbers should be used to indicate the author's corresponding position, organization and, if applicable, the address. The use of abbreviation is not accepted.

The Contents

The full paper must contain the 1) Abstract, 2) Introduction (with Rationale and Objectives), 3) Methodology (with the specific project implementation/management experiences, practices or strategies), 4) Discussion/Innovation, 5) Conclusion and Recommendations, and 6) References.

Submission of formatted full paper

All full paper submissions should be in soft copy format (MS Word version), laid-out on A4 size paper, with one (1) inch margins on all sides. Maximum number of pages is 10 including the abstract, tables, figures, diagrams, references and appendices. Font type is Times New Roman and font size is 12 pts for text and 14 pts for titles of new sections, using single space. No indents to be used on new paragraphs. All paragraphs are to be right-justified. Each paragraph must be separated by two lines from the previous section's last paragraph.

All papers are to be identified by file names as follows: <surname of principal author.firstname>.<name of organization.doc>. For example, a paper from Lucille Galicha of USeP will be galicha.lucille.USeP.doc and if the author has more than one paper the papers should be identified as follows: galicha.lucille1.USeP.doc and galicha.lucille2.USeP.doc.

Presentation of Papers

In case the presenter fails to submit the paper prior to the conference, he/she is advised to submit the full-length paper (soft copy and four hard copies) upon registration during the conference. All presentations shall be via Powerpoint or Prezi, which should be readable from a distance of about 15-20 meters. The actual time allotted for presentation is 10 minutes.
